Teaching Philosophy

I'm here because I'm a cognitive linguist passionate about the field, and hope that through this course I can help you to see the beauty of language and thought that drives my own intellectual curiosity. I enjoy thinking about different ways to present these abstract and sometimes difficult concepts to you, and strive to provide interactive activities that will allow you to engage with the material. By guiding your exploration of the material, I hope that you will not only learn the concepts of the course through exploration, but also make the learning process your own.

Email Policy

During the week I check my email once a day, typically (but not guaranteed) in the afternoon. On the weekends, I check my email once on Sunday afternoons. Because of this, please email me early if you have questions or concerns (I'll respond within 24 hrs during the week, 48 on weekends). I am happy to answer short questions and take OH appointments by email, but if your email would require a lengthy response, I will ask you to come in to see me instead - talking in person will be more effective.

Attendance and Participation

Section is your opportunity for guided practice of the concepts you learn in class and readings, and is an important part of the learning process of this course. For that reason, attendance in section is mandatory. We understand, though, that you have a life outside this class, so you are allowed **two "free" absences**. Use them wisely; we suggest looking at your obligations during the semester and saving your free absences for the days you know you will be out of town or at an extracurricular event. After your two free absences, each subsequent absence will result in a deduction of 3% from your final course grade. Also, because arriving late is disruptive to the entire class, we incentivize your timely arrival with a policy that **three tardies will count as an absence**. Absences will only be excused for unavoidable and justifiable conflicts and only with at least 24 hour advanced notice. In the event of such an unavoidable conflict, you may be able to attend an alternative section, but you must contact the GSIs for *both* sections at least 24 hours in advance to secure permission. We want to continue to offer you this privilege, so *please don't abuse it*.

Participation includes, but is not limited to: active engagement, answering and posing questions, and a willingness to share the floor and discuss other people's contributions during activities and discussion. Because we want you focused and fully engaged in the section material, **no laptops are allowed**. They are distracting to you, and distracting to those around you.

Assignments

Although you may not need this much space for early assignments, ALL homework assignments have a length limit of **5 double-spaced pages of 12-point font** with 1-inch margins. Longer submissions will be graded based on the contents of the first five pages. All assignments must be typewritten; <u>no handwritten assignments will be accepted</u>.

Assignments will be due **in person in hard copy, at the beginning of the class lecture** on the specified due date. If your paper is late, it is your responsibility to be in touch with your GSI to make arrangements for submission; you will be docked half a check for every 24 hours up to 2 days, after which point the assignment can no longer be submitted. Please remember that we are on a tight grading cycle to get things back to you quickly; and besides, once an assignment has been discussed in class, it's not possible to accept late work on that assignment.
